## 1. Economic & Downtown Development/Jobs/Tourism

4-2 A mistake on the bills of thousands of Olmsted County homeowners now has officials scrambling. When calls started coming in, county employees realized they had a problem. About 30,000 homeowners who normally make their own tax payments are getting statements telling them the payments will be escrowed... and not providing an envelope to send a payment. The property records department says everything else on the statements... including the property value... is correct.

4-24 Nationally the unemployment rate rose to 5.1% in March. Some economists think that is the most dramatic indication that the country has fallen into a recession. Minnesota's unemployment rate falls just slightly lower than the national average, so how hard is it to find a job during these tough economic times?

4-27 World rice prices have also hit a record high. Costs have risen nearly 70% this year in the United States and these prices are now hitting stores right here in Rochester.

4-29 Some 800-thousand taxpayers will see more money in their bank accounts by the end of today. The extra cash is part of the \$168-billion economic stimulus package intended to spur consumer spending and revive the economy. Some stores are offering special incentives to entice consumers but some of those consumers think this extra cash isn't all that enticing.

5-5 The city of Albert Lea could soon be seeing more artists if one of its new plans to revitalize downtown goes through. Officials from Artspace toured downtown Albert Lea today, deciding whether or not they will go through with a project that would help the city with its revitalization plan, and also create a place for local artists to call home.

5-8 If you filled up your gas tank yesterday, you probably noticed that gas prices have spiked again... as high as 22 cents in some places. In Zumbrota, drivers are dealing with gas prices at \$3.65/gallon, and in Rochester gas prices can be seen as high as \$3.59. NewsCenter's Fanna Haile-Selassie shows us how drivers are coping with the soaring prices.

5-14 Winona is planning on renovating many of its recreational activities buildings and equipment. The city got a recent boost in cash to help pay for it. The Winona Area Youth Hockey Association said it will donate half a million dollars toward the recreational renovation. The association also has a stake in the plan—it wants to add a new \$4.5-million ice rink. The donation will go towards the pledge that \$2.5-million dollars will come from private funds.

5-14 If you eat out in downtown Rochester on Monday night, you may have to bring a coin and a lucky flip. Some downtown restaurants are participating in "Flip Night" put on by the Rochester Downtown Alliance and the Convention and Visitor's Bureau.

5-16 A sesquicentennial is a big milestone. And Minnesota is celebrating in a big way. Throughout the week, various cities have been given the honor "Capital for a Day." Today, It's Winona's turn. With all that's going on, this river town is the place to be.

6-10 In light of this week's flooding, money is also on the minds of businesses trying to get by. And for the City of Lanesboro, this time of year is its target season for seeing big dollar signs. Crystal Oko tells us how Lanesboro wants tourists to know... it's still open for business.

## 2. Political/Governmental

4-5 This morning, Austin held the First Congressional District Independent Party convention. Several speakers urged Independent Party leaders to go and reach residents in their community and tell them what the party is all about.

4-10 The Albert Lea City Council chamber was packed with people waiting to see the governor... the city received its wish of state funding to clean up the Northedge water park. In recognition of the project making it into the bonding bill, Gov. Pawlenty ceremoniously signed the bill in front of the crowd. Leaders of Albert Lea were so pleased, they presented the governor with a key to the city.

4-16 As it has since his arrival in the United States... Tibetan unrest is following the Dalai Lama on this trip. Today dozens of Chinese protesters are lining the streets surrounding Mayo Clinic... letting everyone know about their anger with the spiritual leader.

4-26 Minnesota legislators and constituents gathered for the Rochester Area Chamber of Commerce's Eggs and Issues meeting. The topic? Connecting Rochester to Minnesota passenger rails. Representative Alice Hausman, a long-time supporter of a passenger rail line, took questions from the audience and talked about the importance of connecting Rochester to the rest of the state.

5-1 State Senator Dave Senjem is on a mission to save the Mantorville dam. The Department of Natural Resources is recommending that the dam be torn down. Sen. Senjem said today that taking away the dam would ruin the beauty of a historic town. The legislation calls for up to \$150-thousand to be spent to repair the structure. But with less than a month left in the legislative session, the senator says odds this year are not in the dam's favor.

5-15 The clock is ticking on lawmakers after a late night standstill causes one party to give up on negotiations. Last night, legislative leaders headed back to the table with some big issues that will affect you and your kids. NewsCenter's Chris Woodard says despite some early optimism... there are still no agreements after last night's conversations.

5-22 Governor Tim Pawlenty signed a bill last week that could give dental hygienists more duties, to allow hygienists to do work normally done by a dentist. It's all meant to help the under-served get dental help. But it's not without some controversy. NewsCenter's Fanna Haile-Selassie tells us why.

5-23 In a cost-cutting measure, the Minnesota Board of Public Defense is considering laying off dozens of public defense attorneys to try and erase a 4-point-seven million dollar deficit. Chris Hrapsky has the story.

5-30 Republicans kicked off a big day of events today at the GOP convention, held at Rochester's Mayo Civic Center. Despite bickering among some party members, one decision was made at the end of

the day: the Republican Party officially voiced its support for incumbent Republican U.S. Senator Norm Coleman. He's a strong contender for re-election, and maintains the biggest threat to America is "defeatism."

6-6 Howard Dean may have been the highlight of the day... but you don't have to look far to figure out what's really on peoples' minds. The clock is ticking on the Senate race and both sides are scrambling to come out on top. NewsCenter's Chris Woodard is live at the Civic Center with the story.

6-6 It's round two for state political conventions taking place in Rochester...and today's DFL state convention could be packed with political drama. For the candidates in the U.S. Senate race, it's been month after month of hard campaigning to see who will challenge Republican U.S. Senator Norm Coleman in the upcoming election. And with the recent headlines questioning front-runner Al Franken's character, the fight for the DFL endorsement is up for grabs.

6-21 The City of Austin hosted U.S. Senator Amy Klobuchar as she came to tour the city's flood damage. Austin's mayor and the city engineer explained to the senator about the city's past major floods and how this last recent one affected the city. Klobuchar said she was impressed by the city's action to move nearly 300 homes and businesses out of the repeated flood areas since about 1979. Klobuchar said she wants to bring back the stories and images she sees in Austin to Washington.

### 3. Health Care Developments

4-10 The condition can be triggered by bacteria or a virus, but basically it's when the lining around the brain and spinal chord becomes infected. It is a rare thing, but with four cases locally in the last five weeks, people are very concerned because even the Minnesota Department of Health doesn't know what's causing it.

4-11 According to the U.S. Census Bureau, more Minnesotans are without health insurance than ever before. The rising cost of health care is partly to blame. Local lawmakers say this bill will make Minnesota a healthier, better, and more affordable place to live.

4-15 Thousands of bars, restaurants and workplaces will be smoke-free starting July 1st, when Iowa's smoking ban takes effect. The bill has exemptions like the gambling areas of casinos, and the Iowa Veterans Home in Marshalltown. Iowa is the 28th state to enact an indoor smoking ban. It is Iowa's latest answer to smoking—last year the state increased the per-pack cigarette tax by a dollar.

4-20 The Hennepin Medical Center in St. Paul and Mayo Clinic in Rochester are two of the only places in Minnesota with hyperbaric chambers--that is, until now. The Albert Lea Medical Center is joining the list... making it easier for patients to recover, one breath at a time.

4-30 It's been a popular illegal drug for years but marijuana use may soon be accepted in Minnesota. At least in some medical situations. Someone who suffers from chronic pain, a former sheriff, who's been on the front line in the war against drugs, says there is no question that Governor Tim Pawlenty should allow this bill to become law.

5-8 Nausea, severe vomiting and diarrhea are symptoms none of us want to experience. But unfortunately, some young children are. And it's causing one local elementary school to take some preventive measures.

5-16 Doctors say that more and more women with early stage breast cancer are choosing to have the whole breast removed instead of just the cancerous lump. A study of 5,500 women at the Mayo Clinic says mastectomies are on the rise. Five years ago, only 30% chose mastectomies. Three years later, 43% were opting for more radical treatment, including double mastectomies.

5-16 From a computerized knee brace to the first FDA approved artificial hip, Mayo Clinic's orthopedic practice has been a world leader. Now it's getting a state-of-the-art facility to match.

6-5 Osteoporosis is a disease that weakens bones, causing them to break easily. Usually it affects older women, but now it's become a growing problem for men.

### 4. Education

4-4 According to the man who steers this ship, despite some early bumps in the road, the only place for this university to go... is up. Just a few blocks away, Chancellor Stephen Lehmkuhle is being inaugurated. Before the big ceremony, he sat down to talk with us.

4-11 It's becoming an awful problem for schools. As districts across the state struggle with a lack of money, Pine Island faces the reality that eliminating teachers or programs could be only one week away. At a meeting last night, people had an opportunity to voice their opinions.

4-23 The University of Minnesota is teaming up with a Rushford company to create cutting-edge technology, as well as much-needed jobs. NewsCenter's Crystal Oko looks inside this new partnership and finds out it's just one more step on the long road to recovery for a flood ravaged town.

5-2 Winona State University sent hundreds of graduates out into the work force today for the 150th time in the university's history. Family and friends turned out to celebrate the event despite the economy's bad outlook. Fanna Haile-Selassie has the story of one growing family of nurses.

5-14 We continue our look into the Rochester School District's new five-year plan to close an achievement gap among students. NewsCenter's Fanna Haile-Selassie says this gap starts early on in school--as early as third grade--but that's also when the state actually starts testing students.

5-28 One school district is the latest example of a sad trend: it's facing a drastic budget deficit. For the Stewartville School District, it's a deficit with 250-thousand question marks. NewsCenter's Chris Woodard says it's a big challenge for the district.

### 5. Crime Prevention & Domestic Violence

4-14 Police officers say it is one of the most dangerous calls they can receive. And when it comes to domestic violence \*victims\*... it's often a situation where those officers are all they have left. Chris Woodard is live in the newsroom with more on what some officers are doing to go above and beyond.

4-18 It's located in a state-of-the-art training center on the heart of the Winona State University campus. And it is the first of its kind in the country. What goes on inside, though, is supposed to help protect the hundreds of thousands of children living on the outside.

4-24 After a string of recent crimes, particularly the two shootings this week, Rochester police are saying perhaps it shouldn't be a surprise as the mercury continues to rise. An increase in problems is nothing new for police around this time of year.

5-22 Two juveniles were sentenced this week on harassment charges that were racially motivated. Authorities say the incidents happened back in September of 2007 and include spitting and racial slurs. NewsCenter's Fanna Haile-Selassie has the story.

6-2 It's a program we've profiled before... a program that will help police enforce the law and free up time for full-time cops to work on serious cases. Now... it's going into place. Meghan Sparks tagged along with two "community service officers" as they hit the streets of Rochester for the first time.

6-16 It was a day of training for the Olmsted County Sheriff's Office. The county recently purchased 27 new rifles and a portion of the deputies spent today learning how to properly shoot and maintain the new firearms. Meghan Sparks has the story.

6-27 There are several children, though, who are learning to shoot properly at a shooting range. NewsCenter's Fanna Haile-Selassie caught up with a few kids learning the A-B-C's of gun safety.

## 6. Elderly/Handicapped/Minority Groups/Racism

4-3 Even with the temps creeping up a bit, no one should doubt the commitment that 20 or so Saint Mary's students are making tonight. Their decision? To spend the night here in a cardboard box and bring to light the plight of millions of people who don't have a proper place to sleep. Thursday's event dubbed "Shack-a-thon" raises money for Habitat for Humanity.

4-18 Poland native and holocaust survivor Gunther Skaletz today shared his story to eighth graders at Winona Middle School. Skaletz was just 12 years-old when WWII broke out. He was sent to the worst concentration camp - Auschwitz. He spent six months there before becoming a prisoner in a Russian work camp.

4-20 It has been quite a weekend for a group of World War Two veterans, flying all the way to Washington, D.C., to experience the memorial built in their honor. Chances are good the smiles still haven't faded for the deserving men and women... especially those who had a chance to share it with family.

4-21 They serve.. and all they ask for in return is that the government fulfill its obligation to take care of them. So Representative Tim Walz and House Speaker Nancy Pelosi were in Minneapolis this morning for a round table discussion on veterans' services.

5-1 Now the story of an immigrant who came to this country in search of a new life. Through hard work and genuine compassion, he has become a leader and a friend to the community.

6-2 Iowa's attorney general is reviewing a state law that many say doesn't help immigrants. The state's English-only law was passed by the Iowa Legislature in 2002 and is now under some major debate.

6-16 They come from all across the country in search for some fun and adventure. Campers at the Wheelchair Sport and Recreation Camp don't let their disability limit them.

6-27 It's a sacred honor that requires dedication, leadership, and compassion. The Diocese of Winona will make history this weekend by ordaining a priest from Mexico for the first time. NewsCenter's Chris Hrapsky has more on the story.

## 7. Environment

4-22 Regular incandescent light bulbs are now a thing of the past. Today, CFL or "compact fluorescent light" bulbs are making their mark by saving people energy and time. Some companies are even offering incentives for their customers--but are the possible health risks associated with these kinds of bulbs worth it? Meghan Sparks has more.

4-25 Do you have a bunch of old electronics that you just don't know what do with? Well now, you can get rid of those items for free... at of all places... a place where you buy things: Apache Mall.

5-7 It's time to dust off those rods and reels for the Minnesota fishing opener this weekend. Each year over a million anglers hit the water, but with gas prices at an all time high some expect to see fewer lines in the water this coming Saturday.

5-16 An Energy Department report has found that wind turbines might produce up to a fifth of the nation's electricity in just two decades. Now Riverland Community College wants to be a part of that future by implementing a wind turbine technician program. NewsCenter's Meghan Sparks has our story.

6-3 We're going to introduce you now to one man who is building his dream home... and helping the environment at the same time. NewsCenter's Fanna Haile-Selassie goes behind closed doors.

6-5 It's an annual battle for homeowners and city leaders--a fight to rid backyards, medians, and street corners of the pesky dandelion. NewsCenter's Jennifer Hoff says it looks like some people aren't keeping up with their end of the bargain.

6-16 It was a nice weekend to get outside... and a beautiful weekend for a boat ride. But if you were going to get out on the lake for some aquatic fun, you couldn't find it on Lake Zumbro. NewsCenter's Crystal Oko explains why there's no wake on the lake.

6-20 Although the flood waters have receded in many areas, a danger still lurks hundreds of feet below the surface. Health officials say thousands of people in Fillmore County may be putting themselves at risk if they don't get their water systems tested. NewsCenter's Chris Hrapsky joins us live in the newsroom.

6-25 Berries galore. This year has turned out to be an excellent year for Minnesota strawberry growers, all thanks to our unseasonably cool and wet spring. But how are our local berry growers faring? Meghan Sparks has more.

### 8. Youth

4-28 Well the store closed at nine, but it will reopen tonight at midnight just to sell the Grand Theft Auto Four game that's already on back order. The game promises the same violent and mature content as the first three. Parents are asking the same question...do I want my child exposed to it?

4-28 It's a statistic that no state is proud to be number one for. Minnesota has the highest death rate among teen drivers in the nation. And NewsCenter's Chris Hrapsky says it's a pretty shocking statistic.

4-29 It's prom season. And while many teenagers are getting excited for the night, some are worried about what that evening could bring... like the consequences of drunk driving.

5-9 Before she was old enough to drive, one local teenager began changing lives half a world away with something as simple as a toilet. Today she is being recognized by Governor Tim Pawlenty. But as NewsCenter's Chris Woodard shows us, those who really appreciate Naomi Wentz's dedication are those whose lives she's improving forever.

6-5 The Pine Island School District's long and hard-fought battle to keep its staff resulted with a few cuts, including elementary school principal Todd Keifer. Today, elementary students surprised principal Keifer with a heartfelt goodbye. NewsCenter's Fanna Haile-Selassie caught the tears and well wishes.

6-6 The annual "Take Your Kid Fishing Weekend" begins today... even though the weather kept most people at home. But thousands of kids, parents, and grandparents are expected to grab their bait and tackle Saturday and Sunday for some fun on the water. NewsCenter's Fanna Haile-Selassie caught up with some folks looking forward to the weekend.

6-18 Opened in 2006 to make sure \*every\* boy and girl near Rochester has the chance to enjoy America's game... the Miracle Field is celebrating the end of its first year of organized leagues. And what better way to celebrate than letting the little ones do what they love so much-- play baseball. NewsCenter's Chris Woodard takes us to a field now bringing joy to so many.

6-26 Losing a loved one can be tough on anyone. But imagine being seven years old and losing your Mom... Dad... even a sibling. Many youngsters are left to cope on their own. But as NewsCenter's Jennifer Hoff explains, others are finding strength in numbers.

## 9. Substance Abuse

4-21 He has experienced the horrors of methamphetamine. A former addict--David Parnell--shared those experiences with students at Southland High School this afternoon. Parnell says that meth affects us all. He specifically talked about the problems it can cause for children of drug abusers. The presentation was graphic... but Southland High School and Middle School Principal Ryan Luft says it's something that students will remember.

5-1 A new survey shows one in four Americans share their prescription drugs with family members and other people. In a survey of 700 people across the country... 23% said they'd shared medicines that had been prescribed to them. Antibiotics, allergy and pain medications were the ones most commonly shared.

6-13 Freeborn County deputies went looking for a marijuana stash... and found a drug factory potentially serving thousands of drug users. The bust is being called one of the largest in recent years. NewsCenter's Chris Hrapky reports.
